## Assignments

### I. Concert Report

Please attend a professional orchestra concert. Chamber music concerts or recitals are NOT appropriate for this assignment. You MUST attend a concert with the entire orchestra and a conductor present. Write an essay about your experience following these guidelines:

Format:

- Typed, free of grammatical and spelling errors.
- Write at least 3 pages and attach a ticket stub.

Briefly describe the performance setting and which types/genres of music were performed. Indicate the historical eras that were represented on the program.

List the performing forces and if any verbal remarks were given. Could you follow the order of the performance?

Did you read about the work(s) before or after the performance? If so, in which source(s)?

Were there any aspects of the performance that were unfamiliar to you? If so, what? Were there any aspects about the performance conventions that surprised you? Which?

Choose two works from the program and contrast and compare these works with references to specific musical elements. You must choose two separate movements, or pieces. Your comparison of individual pieces must form the main discussion in your paper!

State your overall reaction to the concert and additional comments.

II. Each student will receive the name of a medieval, Renaissance, or Baroque instrument. Please research this instrument on your own and create a brief introduction to it in presentation format. (Possible instruments include: serpent, psaltery, curtal, dulcimer, harpsichord, bagpipe, regal.)

In your presentation, include:

1. The name of instrument; family of instruments it belongs to.
2. A picture of the instrument, and if possible, a sound or video example that features the instrument being played.
3. Pull together a paragraph or so introducing the instrument. DO NOT COPY AN EXISTING SOURCE, rather, create a new and interesting introduction from the information you have found.
4. At the end of your presentation, list the sources you have used.

Note: Please do NOT use the first response that you see in a Google search. Avoid Wikipedia--instead, explore more specialized and more academic sources offered by the web.
