Course Title : FILM AS DRAMATIC LITERATURE

#### Summarize the need/purpose/reason for this proposal

#### SLOs (Student Learning Outcomes)

1. Identify the distinguishing characteristics of major film genres, auteurs, film movements, and national cinemas;

2. Critically evaluate and compare films within each analysis category;

3. Compare classic and revisionist films within major genres and movements;

4. Analyze the development of narrative and filmic elements across the works of an individual directoras-auteur;

5. Identify major themes in a national cinema and analyze how those themes are communicated through narrative and filmic elements; and,

6. Using a film-studies vocabulary, write a critical analysis of one or more films under one of the categories above, i.e. major film genres, directors-as-auteurs, film movements, and national cinemas.

### SPOs (Student Performance Objectives)

1. Identify the distinguishing characteristics of the types/genres of films included in the films viewed.

2. Identify the distinguishing characteristics of work by the directors/auteurs included in the films viewed.

3. Identify the distinguishing characteristics of film movements included in the films viewed.

4. Identify the distinguishing characteristics of national cinemas included in the films viewed.

5. Apply appropriate critical approaches to the films viewed.

6. In each/critical category, compare and contrast the films viewed.

#### CCOs (Course Content Outline)

The course is divided into four units: genre, auteur, film movements, and national cinema. Each unit is followed by a two-part examination:

an objective short-answer part on the text and a 2-3 page essay (written in class or at home) on the films seen in that unit.



A typical course follows: Week 1--Introduction to film Week 2--Introduction to genre (e.g., screwball comedy)--showing of It Happened One Night Week 3--Palm Beach Story--discussion of composition Week 4--Some Like It Hot--discussion of time Week 5--review and exam Week 6--Introduction to auteur (e.g., Hitchcock)--showing of The 39 Steps--discussion of music and tone Week 7--Strangers on a Train--discussion of theme and plot Week 8--The Birds--discussion of sound Week 9--review, discussion of montage (showing of scenes from Battleship Potemkin), take-home exam Week 10--Introduction to film movements--Cabinet of Dr. Caligari--discussion of German Expressionism Week 11--The Bicycle Thief--discussion of Italian Neo-realism Week 12--Hiroshima Mon Amour--discussion of French New Wave Week 13--review and exam Week 14--Introduction to national cinema (e.g., Japanese)--showing of Rashomon--reading of short stories from which film was adapted and discussion of adaptation Week 15--Ugetsu Week 16--Woman in the Dunes Week 17--discussion and wrap-up Week 18--final essay exam
