Course Title: INTRODUCTION TO SPANISH-AMERICAN LITERATURE

We are updating this course for the AA-T in Spanish.

Besides discussing the authors and their works, origin and philosophy, the students will write short essays and compositions. On outside readings, oral reports will be given.

- 1. Read the selections from María (a novel) by Jorge Isaacs, pages 244-257. Then answer the questions on "Sobre la lectura," pages 259-260. We will discuss "Hacia el análisis literario," and "Texto y vida" next class.
- 2. Write a thorough analysis of not less than two pages on Lo fatal (a short poem) by Rubén Darío.
